On arriving at MBKG P Kasam the logistics of the journey from London were such that I, along with daughters Jessica and Ella, were ready for sleep, just as everyone else was starting their day. However, the immersion into the children of MBKG was instant and total, as they rushed to welcome Jessica, who had just qualified as a Montessori teacher, and was making her third return trip. But there was no need to worry, for, as I was to find continuously, the sheer excitement, energy and interest of the children was totally infectious and kept us all going constantly.

I was one of the last in our family to visit Kasam, and despite the intense and passionate descriptions of earlier visits, and photographs of our sponsored children, and endless tales from my wife and daughter, nothing could have prepared me for the effect of the sea of smiling faces, the hugs and embraces, the white shining teeth, the clang of the plates, the volume of the communal Grace from the children, and their general positive feeling of those first few moments at breakfast in the dining hall. And this infection, from those whom in effect had so relatively little, was a constant source of joy and inspiration throughout my visit.

Not being a teacher, I was set to try and help with conversational English, particularly as a recent inspection had indicated that some of the English pronunciation of the younger teachers was deemed to be wanting. This led for some fairly uncontrolled classes with the 9th and 10th grades, gracefully aided by the teachers. It was great fun for me, and quite a challenge to find common ground in which to channel the childrens' energy, and hopefully lead to some improvement in their spoken word. It made me appreciate the great difference in culture between us, and how that alone can create unintended difficulties from the very best of intentions of a temporary visitor, such as myself.

It was easier, and possibly more effective, when talking to the younger teachers, which we did on a

regular basis; we spoke and read passages from books or newspapers trying to improve their pronunciation, and particularly the rhythm of their phrasing. The correct pronunciation of the letters V and W kept us occupied, and laughing, for much of the time. Again, what impressed me was the dedication and good humour of the staff.

A visit to a neighbouring school highlighted how much rubbish there was around the Kasam campus. Dealing with that led us on to discussions about property maintenance, general management themes and pastoral care, again trying to adjust to the very different environment of a privately sponsored orphanage and school in rural India. At all times I found the staff at all levels to be open, caring and eager for new ideas, and it was after a trip out to the villages, from and to which most of the day school children are bussed, which made so apparent the 'multiplier' effect which an education at MBKG Pannai had on those villages. Although the cycle may take up to 20 years, and many of the staff had been there long enough to witness it, there was no doubt that the outcome of Pauline King's original vision on the rural environment was a positive one.

The culmination of my visit was a performance given by the senior classes, of the various songs we had tried to teach them during Music Lessons. To this

day the echoes of 'If you're happy and you know it ...', with that special and unique Tamil inflection and gusto travel with me as a reminder of the great work and joy that exists at MBKG Pannai.

The Physical Education Directors' seminar was conducted on the King's premises, like most district level meetings every one likes the ambience at the King's school.


Two more children have been added to the existing lunch program.
